This bulletin provides an overview and highlights of the activities of the Global Young Academy (GYA) in the last quarter, as well as upcoming events: the purpose is to help identify and strengthen cooperation with our strategic partners. WORK OF THE GYA

ADVISORY BOARD (AB) MEETS, WELCOMES NEW MEMBERS

The GYA held an in-person meeting of members of its Advisory Board (AB) with 2017/18 Co-Chairs Tolu Oni (UK) and Moritz Riede (UK) and GYA Managing Director Beate Wagner on 29 and 30 March in Oxford, UK. The AB members used the opportunity to obtain better insight into the practical work and challenges of the GYA, while the GYA obtained diverse and useful advice. Having served the maximum of two three-year terms, this year, outgoing members include Howard Alper, Bruce Alberts, Helmut Schwarz, and Mohamed Hassan. GYA INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCE AND ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING HELD IN PATTAYA, THAILAND

Our 8th International Conference and Annual General Meeting (AGM) took place from 7 to 11 May in Pattaya, Thailand, bringing together 115 GYA members and alumni, and a further 55 speakers, guests, and sponsors. The conference addressed the topic ,Forever Young? Sustainable and Healthy Longevity through Science and Technology'.

GYA members conducted elections of new leadership, discussed business arising during the past year, and set out goals and activities for the upcoming year.

New Executive Committee and Co-Chairs elected.

GYA Members elected a new 2018/19 Executive Committee (EC) – 64% of whom are female – with Tolu Oni (UK; re-elected) and Connie Nshemereirwe (Uganda) being chosen as Co-Chairs. The following 9 EC members are all newly-elected unless otherwise indicated: Anina Rich (Australia); Abdalhadi Alijla (Sweden); Adewale Adewuyi (Nigeria); Xuan Bach Tran (Vietnam); Koen Vermeir (France); Laura Fierce (USA; re-elected); Rothsophal Nguon (Cambodia); Yoko Shimpuku (Japan). A key focus of the new Executive Committee is steering an independent impact evaluation of the GYA over the last 10 years. This evaluation will influence decisions to be made in 2019 with respect to renewing our core funding by our principal funders, the German Federal Ministry of Education and Research. The results will also guide our theory of change for the next 10 years, and will be presented at our anniversary AGM. We are in the process of setting up this ssessment, and *will call on our strategic artners for input over the upcoming months*. Thank you in advance.

GYA's new members inaugurated.

The GYA welcomed 45 new members to its ranks in 2018. This year's new members represent 34 countries, among them our first members located in Côte d'Ivoire, Namibia, Lebanon, Panama, Peru and Albania. Moreover, this year's members

are comprised of 23 females and 22 males, which brings the gender balance of the GYA membership to 57% male and 43% female. The GYA now has members and alumni in 83 countries. Biographies of the new members are available here.

Annual General Meeting.

The AGM opened on 8 May with a welcome by 2017/18 GYA Co-Chairs Tolu Oni (UK) and Moritz Riede (UK), and Prof Dr Jutta Schnitzer-Ungefug, Secretary General of the German National Academy of Sciences Leopoldina.

International Conference.

The conference opened on 9 May with two panel discussions; GYA members then presented their work related to healthy ageing in the first Lightning Talk session in the afternoon. A Gala Dinner, organised by the local organising committee and opened by UNESCO Assistant Director General Flavia Schlegel, wrapped up the day. The second day began with a Keynote address by Nobel Laureate Prof Harald zur Hausen, who discovered that the human papilloma virus (HPV) is the principal cause of cervical cancer. Conference Statement.

Throughout the conference, members contributed to the drafting of the conference statement. A portion of the document states that the aging question needs to be reframed to examine how global and local issues can be better linked and considered from various perspectives. The conference statement will be published in July 2018.

Science outreach.

Led by the GYA's Young Scientists Ambassador Programme, on 12 May GYA members visited Burapha University in Thailand, giving research seminars and answering questions from local university and high school students.

NATIONAL YOUNG ACADEMIES MEET AT AGM, AND IN EUROPE AND ASIA

Global NYAs met at the AGM.

On 10 May 2018, the third day of the GYA's AGM in Thailand, representatives met from 12 National Young Academies and initiatives from Nigeria, Germany, Thailand, Vietnam, Poland, India, Japan, New Zealand, Spain, Hungary, Nepal and Bangladesh. An upcoming NYA survey by the GYA that will focus on NYAs' structures and activities was also discussed, as were ideas for joint future projects.

Asian NYAs meet in Jerusalem. The Israel Young Academy hosted the Asian Young Academies Meeting in Jerusalem on 11 and 12 February 2018 under the theme of 'Science and Society: Challenges and Prospects'. In her address to the meeting on the second day, Professor Nili Cohen, the President of the Israel Academy of Sciences and Humanities, reminded attendees of the great impact that is possible through partnering with senior academies.

European NYAs meet in Amsterdam. Young Academies from all over Europe met in Amsterdam, the Netherlands, on 23 and 24 March 2018. The meeting, organised by the Dutch Young Academy, was the group's largest gathering so far with more than 35 participants representing 17 young academies and academy initiatives. José van Dijck, President of the Royal Netherlands Academy of Arts and Sciences (KNAW), welcomed participants and labelled young academies of sciences 'a brilliant idea'. Recent additions to the young academies network – the Albanian Young Academy, the Estonian Young Academy and the Young Academy Finland – were also represented at the meeting. Representatives from the young academy initiatives from Hungary and Switzerland also attended. More information is available here.

GLOBAL ACCESS TO RESEARCH SOFTWARE REPORT RELEASED AT OPEN SCIENCE WORKSHOP

The Global Access to Research Software (GARS) working group Report titled 'Global Access to Research Software: The Forgotten Pillar of Open Science Implementation' was launched at the conclusion of the international workshop on Open Science, 'New Perspectives on Open Science' on March 20 in Oxford, UK.

The global trend towards Free and Open Source Software (FOSS) is often assumed to be a boon for researchers in low-income countries. However, data revealed by the GYA's GARS working group clearly shows that researchers in Bangladesh, Ghana and Nigeria have only limited knowledge about and experience with FOSS. There also seems to be little interaction between the Open Research Software communities in high-income and low-income countries. These and other issues were uncovered by the GYA, in collaboration with Oxford-based International Network for the Availability of Scientific Publications (INASP), which carried out a pilot survey to assess the quantity and quality of access to proprietary and open source software among researchers from all disciplines based across the globe.

GYA WORKING GROUPS IN ACTION

GYA MEMBERS MAKE A SPLASH AT THE NEXT EINSTEIN FORUM GLOBAL GATHERING

The Next Einstein Forum (NEF) Global Gathering 2018 was held in Kigali, Rwanda from 26 to 28 March, under the patronage of H.E. Paul Kagame, President of the Republic of Rwanda. This year, 18 GYA members and alumni took part. Key GYA highlights included a Women in Science Leadership workshop, a workshop on designing science leadership programmes, and an interactive session held by the GloSYS Africa team.

Women in Science leadership workshop, Rwanda, 22-24 March. The GYA Women in Science working group co-organised a CIFAR Women in Science Leadership Workshop titled 'Fostering diverse and inclusive leadership in academia', which took place as a preevent to the 2018 Global Gathering of the Next Einstein Forum (NEF) in Kigali, Rwanda. Speakers included Agnes Binagwahoo, the Vice Chancellor of Rwanda's University of Global Health Equity, who also formerly served as Rwanda's Minister of Health, Rose Gana Fomban Leke, Emeritus Professor of Immunology and Parasitology and Fellow at the Cameroon Academy of Sciences, Jennifer Thomson, the President of the Organisation for Women in Science for the Developing World (OWSD), and former American Association for the

Next Einstein Forum workshop on science leadership, Rwanda, 25 March.

GYA members contributed to the development of the NEF Science Leadership Programme pre-event on 25 March, a joint workshop with the Robert Bosch Stiftung and the University of Pretoria. The objective of the workshop was to develop a better understanding of the needs and potential impacts of science leadership programmes for universities, research institutions, science bodies and funders.
