GYA Webinar: COVID-19 in Latin America - perspectives from young scientists

A group of GYA members from Latin America are organising a webinar titled "Covid-19 in Latin America: perspectives from young scientists" on 14 May 2020, from 18:00 to 20:00 UTC. Due to historically low expenditures on public health and other structural problems, Latin America faces the COVID-19 pandemic from a weak and vulnerable position. As such, the challenges in this region are harder in comparison with the rest of the world. This webinar brings together 6 Latin American scientists, all members of the GYA, in order to discuss with the general public (in Spanish) their perspectives on this crisis.

The webinar will consist of short talks, and Q&A with the participants. Questions such as the following will be addressed: How did we get to this situation; What are Latin American virologists doing; How to transfer scientific knowledge to the political arena; What emerging technologies are being used in other parts of the world to deal with the pandemic?



INGSA2020 postponed

In light of current events, the INGSA2020 Organizing Committee has delayed the INGSA Conference until 18-21 April 2021. INGSA will also host on **15-16 September 2020** (to be confirmed) a **global virtual conference (INGSA2020-COVID)**, to be focused specifically on the interface of science and policy and on science diplomacy during the current Covid-19 pandemic.
