Climate-neutral GYA air travel

Since 2021, the GYA has been committed to offsetting carbon from every flight taken on our behalf.

In 2021 – a year of low air travel due to the pandemic – 11.2 tons of CO_2 (originating

from approximately 44,000 kilometers of flights) were compensated.

In the period 2021-2023, greenhouse gases will be offset through a **biomass-based climate project in India**.

For climate reasons, the GYA encourages its members and staff to use public transport instead of flying for any distance less than 1,000 kilometers, or any distance that public transport can cover in up to 8 hours.



	This book offers a new theoretical framework for free speech by addressing critically the general free speech theories as well as focusing on specific topics such as academic freedom, media freedom and hate speech. German Young Academy suggest improvements to research

Policy have criticised the current system used to allocate research funding and have suggested routes for improvement, in a correspondence piece titled "Why many funding schemes harm rather than support research" in *Nature Human Behaviour*, released on 31 January 2022. They argue that the "external funding system is an expensive lottery", and that "many of the current research funding schemes involve a great deal of work on the part of the applicants, who then have a relatively low chance of actually being allocated the funding they have applied for".

The aim of the Design Challenge was to reflect on the relation between climate change and human rights, to present it in a creative way and thus to promote dialogue between science, politics and society.


2022 André Mischke Young Academy of Europe Prize for Science and Policy
