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AGM 2018 updates

Continued progress is being made on the upcoming AGM and International Conference for Young Scientists 'Forever Young? Sustainable and healthy longevity through science and technology', 7-11 May, in Pattaya, Thailand. Confirmed speakers include Prof Harald zur Hausen, who was awarded the *Nobel Prize* in Medicine in 2008 for finding the connection between HPV viruses and cervical carcinomas. Special guests will include Princess Sumaya bint Hassan of Jordan, who is active at a local, regional and international level in the promotion of science, research, and technology. In addition to the main programme, we are planning pre-conference workshops for building capacity among our members, which is at the core of many of our activities. Registration will open in early February, and continuous updates are available on the <u>event site</u>.

GYA publishes Statement addressing the world's vanishing flora and fauna In January 2018, the GYA issued a Position Statement titled '<u>Global Young Academy</u> <u>Position Statement on Conservation of Biodiversity: Protecting Molecular Diversity</u> <u>and Biomedical Discoveries</u>'. Driven by the Bio2Bio Working Group, the Statement outlines key challenges and possible avenues for solving them. The Statement was sent to various national academies of science and universities around the world, as well as to partners such as the World Health Organization, the International Council for Science, and the United Nations Environment Programme. Additionally, output from group members recently appeared in *The Journal of Global Health*, which published a viewpoint article titled '<u>Biodiversity, drug discovery, and the future of</u> <u>global health: Introducing the biodiversity to biomedicine consortium, a call to action</u>'.

Members of GloSYS Africa research team met in Halle 15-16 January

Members of the GloSYS Africa research team, including core team members <u>Abidemi</u> <u>Akindele</u> (GYA alumnus), <u>Abeslam Badre</u>, <u>Anna Coussens</u>, and <u>Mona Khoury-</u> <u>Kassabry</u>, converged at the GYA offices in Halle in January. The two-day meeting included an intensive workshop in which the project's research assistants received training from project advisor Lynn McAlpine on the collection and analysis of interview data. In parallel, the core GYA team met with GloSYS project researcher Marie Neumann to discuss the data collected to date, project logistics and milestones, as well as to organise the upcoming workshop <u>side event</u> at the Next Einstein Forum (see further information below). The GloSYS team left Halle having solved a number of logistical issues and with an even stronger sense of purpose and team spirit, and ready to begin the third project phase, which involves the collection and analysis of roughly 80 hours of interview data.

Two newly formed NYAs in Northern Europe

Young Academy Finland (YAF) is an independent, cross-disciplinary forum for some of the most promising young researchers in Finland in all disciplines. Arab-Germany Young Academy (<u>AGYA</u>) launces science comic

The 1st AGYA Science Comic was launched on 26 January 2018 in Berlin. In the comic (available as a <u>.pdf file</u>), the AGYA Science Jinn sets out to explain scientific revelations to young and forever young readers. His first mission is pictured in the graphic novel 'The Rise of the Incredible Salty Salicornia Power Plant' about the next botanic superhero of our times – the powerful Halophyte. (In a humorous aside, the comics claims that the Science Jinn is '... currently an advisor for the new Berlin airport – but even his powers are sometimes limited...')

Junge Akademie calls for defence of academic freedom and freedom of publishing

In August 2017, academic publishing companies including Cambridge University Press revealed that they were increasingly receiving demands for censorship from the People's Republic of China (read The Guardian article <u>here</u>). In response, on 24 January 2018 the <u>Junge Akademie at the Berlin-Brandenburg Academy of Sciences</u> <u>and Humanities</u> (BBAW) issued a press release calling for the defence of academic freedom. An excerpt from the press release reads as follows: 'The Junge Akademie regards these developments with utmost concern and calls on all academic publishers to stand up for the principles of the freedom of academia and publishing as well as academic integrity and quality, and to defend these principles as well as their authors and readers against any and every attempt at political control and other types of restriction issuing from the People's Republic of China or any other possible direction.'

The forum provided a platform for youth to engage in a dialogue with EU Member States and to discuss the policy frameworks and promote innovative, institutionalised approaches and initiatives for advancing the youth development agenda at the national, regional and global levels with a view to promoting solutions to the global challenge of strengthening resilience and sustainable development. 26-28 March 2018. The Next Einstein Forum Global Gathering 2018 connects science, society and policy in Africa and the rest of the world – with the goal of leveraging science for human development globally. The GYA, in partnership with the Canadian Institute for Advanced Research, the African Institute for Mathematical Sciences, and the African Academy of Sciences, are co-organising a Women in Science leadership workshop pre-event on 22-24 March to support the development of the next generation of female researchers. The GYA is also partnering with the Robert Bosch Stiftung and the University of Pretoria to co-organise a 25 March workshop titled 'Connecting Networks to Co-Design Transformative Science Leadership Programmes for Africa.' Further, the GloSYS Africa team will present its initial study results in a side event on 28 March. GYA members are also contributing to the development of the NEF Science Leadership Programme pre-event on 25 March. The Next Einstein Forum is an initiative of the African Institute for Mathematical Sciences (AIMS) in partnership with the Robert Bosch Stiftung. The Global Gathering 2018 will be held in Kigali, Rwanda under the patronage of H.E. Paul Kagame, President of the Republic of Rwanda.
