The death of George Floyd while being detained by police in the United States city of Minneapolis on 25 May 2020 has spawned a global movement. The GYA supports the Black Lives Matter (#BLM) movement and all such movements fighting racism and discrimination around the world.

As a global science organization, we at the GYA re-commit to ensuring that our internal and external work combats racism and systemic bias resulting in discrimination in all its forms, across race, culture, religion, gender, sexual identity and orientation, socio-economic status, caste, or physical ability. Also of great concern are systemic injustices that silence or erase knowledge because of their authors' occupations, disciplines, socio-cultural and ethnic backgrounds, gender and sexuality, or political affiliations.

The GYA Office staff are now taking a well-deserved break to recharge their batteries. Thus, the GYA Office will be closed from 25 July to 9 August.



The GYA is looking for new members to join us!


Applications are sought from young, independent scholars who combine the highest level of research excellence with a demonstrated passion for delivering impact.

Applicants should be in the early to middle years of their independent careers. The majority of the GYA members are aged 30-40 and the typical period from completion of a PhD or similar degree is 3-10 years. Applicants falling outside these ranges are still invited to send their applications with a justification for why they should be considered.


GYA-UNESCO e-Workshop: Open Science from a Global Perspective

Supercomputing Centre, Spain), who in 2019 also was a founding member of the Young Academy of Spain, has been nominated by the GYA, and selected to be a member of the Expert Panel of the InterAcademy Partnership's COVID-19 Advisory Group.

In addition, five GYA members and alumni have been selected to be a part of the larger Advisory Group: Daniel Limonta (University of Alberta, Cuba), Michael Biron (University of Haifa, Israel), Gergely Toldi (Birmingham Women's Hospital, United Kingdom), Junpeng Li (Central China Normal University, China), and GYA alumnus Rees Kassen (University of Ottawa, Canada). The goal of this multi-disciplinary group is to provide a mechanism for other academies, national


governments or others to obtain reliable information related to COVID-19 and its implications in different countries. The Expert Panel of about 20 academy-nominated members of diverse expertise around the world will lead the group, and work closely with three Co-chairs of the Panel, the IAP Secretariat and Steering Committee, and will help identify the appropriate experts within the Advisory Group and coordinate responses to each inquiry. 2020 European Young Academies meeting

Young Academies from all over Europe met online from 4-5 July 2020. The meeting was hosted by the <u>Junge Akademie</u> (Germany), and saw the highest number of participation ever, bringing together representatives from 22 young academies and academy initiatives. Science and art publication by Belgian Young Academy

The <u>Jonge Academie</u> (Belgium) have published a book on "OVERLAP – The No Man'S Land between Art and Science", which provides a contemporary state of the art overview of the multitude of practices on the border – or in the overlap – between art and science.

exploration of this borderland – the overlap – between science and art resulted in a 'paper exhibition' with 52 artistic contributions and 12 essays, matching the rhythm of a calendar year. Each contribution offers a unique perspective in a dialogue that does not result in an unambiguous picture."

Arab-German Young Academy podcast

The Arab-German Young Academy (AGYA) have started a podcast titled "<u>AGYA goes viral</u>", which invites the listener to explore the diverse implications of COVID-19 for science and society at large. In each episode, Arab and German AGYA members and alumni from different scientific disciplines come together to discuss research on and amidst the coronavirus pandemic. As the current situation challenges societies in unprecedented ways, this platform aims to serve as a space for dialogue and lead to inspiring exchange.

German Young Academy talk on digital museum data

Members of the Junge Akademie (Germany), Isabelle Dolezalek, Simon Wolfgang Fuchs and Valeska Huber, are currently working on a project concerning digital data and related research formats. In this context, art consultant and curator Dr Anne Luther will deliver an online evening lecture on "Activating Museum Data: Possibilities of Digital Data in Museums" on 11 August 2020, at 17:00 UTC, via Zoom.

As well-connected institutions, museums are engaged globally with the objects that they display, archive and study. Information is often collected and stored in digital databanks. What can we learn from investigating this digital material? With international examples from the past five years, insight into the study, use, and visualisation of museum data will be given, to open up new perspectives on physical objects and the history of museums.


