Foreword by the Co-Chairs

Welcome to the May edition of our monthly newsletter – and what a month it was! Our long-awaited Annual General Meeting and International Conference of Young Scientists took place in Pattaya, Thailand from 7 to 11 May, and was the best-attended to date with 95 members, 8 alumni, and a further 78 guests (181 people total) from 52 countries in attendance. We were also proud to offer a two-day Science Leadership Programme to new members, and Presentation Coaching to all members prior to the start of the AGM. We were honoured to have Prof Dr Jutta Schnitzer-Ungefug, Secretary General of the German National Academy of Sciences Leopoldina attending to open the AGM. We are also thrilled to welcome 45 new members, 23 women and 22 men hailing from 34 countries, who were inaugurated at the start of the AGM. This AGM also honoured 11 members who became alumni. We will miss them as active members, but with our alumni numbers exceeding members for the first time this year, we look forward to engaging with them and other alumni for years to come.

This year's conference theme, 'Forever Young? Sustainable and healthy longevity through science and technology', stirred up interesting interdisciplinary and intergenerational dialogue between members and esteemed guests (including a Nobel Laureate!) on the possibilities for, and implications of, ageing for humanity and the planet.

With chants of 'Sleep is for the plane ride home' and 'My other family is at home' being echoed throughout the week, the working spirit of the AGM, and camaraderie of the GYA community, was felt in the corridors, nooks and crannies of the hotel at all hours with working groups and committees making the best of the week to achieve their goals.

Lastly, the AGM marked the end of the Executive Committee's term, and the General Assembly elected a new EC team to lead the organisation over the next year. We thank the previous EC for their dedication over the last year, and look forward to serving members and advancing the goals of the GYA in the year ahead and beyond.

GYA's new members inaugurated at AGM in Pattaya, Thailand

The GYA proudly welcomed 45 new members to its ranks in Pattaya. This year's new members represent 34 countries, among them our first members from Côte d'Ivoire, Namibia, Lebanon, Panama, Peru, and Albania. Moreover, this year's members are comprised of 23 females and 22 males, which pushes the gender balance of the GYA membership to 57% male and 43% female. Reminder to apply for the North-South Interdisciplinary Grant 2018/19

The 2018 call for applications for the GYA North-South Interdisciplinary Project Grant is still open: applications should be submitted by 15 June 2018.

This grant scheme, introduced at the AGM 2014, seeks to support the development of small-scale, innovative, curiosity-driven, blue-sky, exploratory research pilots or prototypes that unite researchers in developed and developing countries and cross-disciplinary boundaries. Each year, the GYA can grant up to 10,000 EUR to the best project. Project ideas should innovatively combine research questions from very different disciplines. There is no limit to your imagination and creativity!

With this grant, we aim to provide start-up financing for daring yet promising research projects that demonstrate out-of-the-box thinking and therefore may have difficulties receiving funding under conventional grant schemes. The discussion covered NYA-related issues such as how to found an NYA, the young academies and their relationship to senior academies, as well as NYAs' independence, activities and projects. The upcoming NYA survey by the GYA, which focuses on NYAs' structures and activities was also discussed, as were ideas for joint future projects. Participants were also informed that the next Worldwide Meeting of Young Academies will take place in Vietnam in 2019. United Nations Multi-Stakeholder Forum on Science, Technology and Innovation

<u>Tolu Oni</u> (UK) will present during a United Nations side event on Intergenerational Dialogue, Capacity Building and Lifelong Learning, and <u>John Malone</u> (USA) will present on the Implications of Emerging Biotechnologies in the Context of Biological Diversity, as well as a <u>DIY Biology</u> policy brief during the United Nations Third Multi-Stakeholder Forum on Science, Technology and Innovation (STI Forum) in New York City.

Both events are co-organised by the GYA and will take place on 5-7 June 2018 in Conference Rooms 4 and 2, UN Headquarters.

In preparation for the STI Forum, a Youth Blast will take place 4 June from 14:00 to 18:00 (UTC -5:00) at the UNFPA Orange Cafe located at 605 3rd Ave, New York, NY 10158. The STI Forum is the main avenue that the UN has to foster science, technology, and innovation cooperation for the implementation of the SDGs.

International Network for Government Science Advice (INGSA)

The GYA, in partnership with the <u>Young Academy of Japan</u>, has been invited to develop and run a capacity-building, science leadership workshop for young scientists attending the biannual global INGSA meeting. This year the meeting, <u>INGSA2018 Science Advice in a Changing World</u>, will be held in Tokyo, Japan, from 6 to 7 November. Co-Chair <u>Tolu Oni</u> (UK) is liaising with INGSA partners to develop this programme in partnership with GYA Co-Chair <u>Connie Nshemereirwe</u> (Uganda) and GYA member <u>Binyam Mendisu</u> (Ethiopia) – both of whom have facilitated previous SLP workshops – as well as INGSA workshop facilitators and representatives from the Japan Young Academy.

GYA Annual General Meeting and Conference, 7 to 11 May 2018

As mentioned before, the 8th International Conference and Annual General Meeting of the Global Young Academy took place from 7 to 11 May in Pattaya, Thailand, bringing together 103 GYA members and alumni. The conference addressed the topic 'Forever Young? Sustainable and Healthy Longevity through Science and Technology'.

Annual General Meeting

The Annual General Meeting (AGM) officially opened on 8 May with a welcome by GYA Co-Chairs Tolu Oni (South Africa) and Moritz Riede (UK), as well as Prof Dr Jutta Schnitzer-Ungefug, Secretary General of the German National Academy of Sciences Leopoldina. Following their remarks, the 2018 new members were inaugurated. This year, the GYA welcomed 45 young scholars and scientists (23 female and 22 male), pushing the GYA's gender balance to 57% male and 43% female. Highlights from the first AGM day included an information fair for members to get to know existing working groups, incubator groups, and member committee activities, and a plenary session on internal reports and discussions looking back at the past year. The AGM proceedings will be minuted. Minutes will be made available on the intranet for members to review.

International Conference

The 8th International Conference opened on the morning of 9 May, inviting public guests to the event and opening up discussions on the conference topic with two panels: 'What does

healthy ageing in the first Lightning Talk session in the afternoon. A <u>Gala Dinner</u>, organised by the local organising committee and eloquently opened by UNESCO Assistant Director General Flavia Schlegel, wrapped up the day.

Day two of the International Conference began with a Key Note Talk by Nobel Laureate Prof Harald zur Hausen, who was awarded the Nobel Prize for Medicine in 2008 for discovering that the human papilloma virus (HPV) is the principal cause of cervical cancer. Prof Zur Hausen spoke on the link between infections and cancers. A follow-up interview with Prof zur Hausen on cancer prevention is available here.

A final panel on 'Humans and nature – environmental aspects of sustainable and healthy longevity' contributed a broader perspective to topics at the cross-section of health and sustainability. In afternoon parallel sessions, members presented their work in the second Lightning Talks 'What do you do and why?' Further highlights of the day were a morning round table discussion on the relationship between the GYA and National Young Academies, and an afternoon science outreach session with the Thai National Science Museum discussing communication of the SDGs to the public and schoolchildren.

Conference Statement

Throughout the conference, members contributed to the drafting of a conference statement, reflecting discussions during the panels as well as provocative questions posed and debated during a world café style session. The conference statement is planned to be published in June 2018.

Outlook

The final day of the AGM was reserved for forward-looking planning. Working groups and incubator groups presented their plans for the coming year, and the <u>newly elected Executive Committee (EC)</u> met with the outgoing EC and with <u>advisory board</u> members in person and virtually. Outgoing members were given a personal farewell at the final dinner.

Science Outreach

Led by the GYA <u>Young Scientists Ambassador Programme</u>, GYA members <u>visited Burapha</u> <u>University in Thailand</u>, giving research seminars and answering questions from local university and high school students.
