2019 AGM and International Conference for Young Scientists: 'Re-enlightenment? Truth, reason and science in a global world'

Interactive panels will examine 'enlightenment in a broad sense and from a global perspective, discussing global and local sources of knowledge, different paths to truth, the role of science and scientists in society, as well as the limits of (re)Enlightenment. Confirmed speakers include Clifford Siskin (Director of the Re-enlightenment project), Amy Luers (Executive Director of Future Earth), Vladimir Sucha (Director-General of the EU Joint Research Centre), and Sheila Jasanoff (Pforzheimer Professor of Science and Technology Studies at the Harvard Kennedy School). An additional panel will deal with the origins and history of the first science academies and learned societies, followed by a discussion on the future of academies, including the young academy movement. The Annual General Meeting surrounding the conference will celebrate the 10th year of the GYA, taking stock of the growth and accomplishments of the GYA over the last 10 years and developing a vision for its future.

German Junge Akademie signals support for academic freedom

In a show of support for the Central European University (CEU), The Junge Akademie (Germany) held its Autumn Plenary Session at CEU, which recently announced its move from Budapest, Hungary, to Vienna, Austria. This move is in response to a law proposed by the Hungarian government that threatened to greatly restrict academic freedom in Hungary in general and specifically challenged CEU's legitimacy.

African National Young Academies of Science gather in Benin

Representatives of ten African National Young Academies (NYAs) had the opportunity to meet and engage with each other at the Académie nationale des sciences, arts et lettres du Bénin (ANSALB) in Cotonou, Benin, in November 2018. This informal meeting focussed on encouraging young scientists and academies to support the United Nation's Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) more effectively.

The <u>4th Worldwide Meeting of Young Academies</u> will take place from 31 July to 2 August 2019 in Da Nang, Vietnam. The meeting will be hosted by the Vietnam Young Academy and co-organised by the GYA. It will be preceded by a 2-day conference on Nanomaterials for Health. Reflecting the global nature of this meeting, the Programme Organising Committee has members not only from the Vietnam Young Academy and the GYA, but from an additional 11 national young academies and academy initiatives: the Dutch Young Academy, the Nigerian Young Academy, the Royal Society of Canada's College of New Scholars, Artists and Scientists, the Indian National Young Academy of Science, the Sri Lanka Academy of Young Scientists, the Thai Young Scientists Academy, the Young Academy of Japan, the Bangladesh NYA Initiative, the Nepal NYA Initiative, the Cameroon Young Scientists Academy Initiative, and the Hungarian NYA Initiative.
