Thank you everyone for participating in this year's e-AGM and e-Conference. Many of you who receive this newsletter joined us on the Whova platform, so we would like you to consider whether you would like to have your Whova profile data removed from Whova's greater platform. This follows the European Union's General Data Protection Regulation's principle of data minimisation. Furthermore, Whova's servers are situated in the United States and thus might result in your data being accessible by third parties with no solid redress mechanism in place for privacy violations.

To have your data be removed from the Whova platform, please write an email to <u>support@whova.com</u> asking for the account linked to the email you used to be deleted. A simple one-liner will suffice.



Honouring visionary ideas for a sustainable future

The Junge Akademie Germany has recently announced the winners of their 2020 *Visions/Solutions* ideas competition. For this online competition, the academy's Sustainability Research Group had accepted entries that engaged with visionary ideas or concrete approaches to a sustainable future. Participants were asked to submit entries in the categories of *Visions* or *Solutions* in a broad range of digital formats – from images and videos to texts and songs to multimedia content. Prizes in the amount of 2,000, 1,500 and 1,000 Euros were awarded to the three best entries in each category. The Academy is celebrating its 20th anniversary this year and the competition, which received support from the UmweltBank AG for the *Solutions* category, represents a continuation of its engagement in developing innovative formats for transferring knowledge. COVID-19 blog post by the UK-wide Young Academy Initiative

Based on data collected in a survey of early-career researchers based in the United Kingdom, a group with GYA member <u>Gergely Toldi</u> (Birmingham Women's Hospital, United Kingdom), alumnus <u>Moritz Riede</u> (University of Oxford, United Kingdom), Project Officer Anna-Maria Gramatté and ECR Charlotta Salmi (UK) have published a blog post titled "<u>Covid-19 is exacerbating early-career researchers' greatest concerns</u>" in Times Higher Education (behind a registration-for-free wall). The group, with support from the Royal Society, British Academy, Royal Academy of Engineering, and the Royal Society of Medicine, is currently working towards the establishment of a UK-wide Young Academy, and the survey was a part of steps taken to ascertain the interest of UK-based ECRs in such a young academy and its work.

SAYAS Webinar

The South African Young Academy of Science (SAYAS) held a webinar on "<u>Women Scientists in</u> <u>the Forefront against COVID-19</u>" in August 2020 in celebration of Women's month. August in South Africa is historically devoted to celebrating the successes of women as a tribute to the more than 20,000 women who marched to the Union Buildings on 9 August 1956 in protest against the extension of Pass Laws to women.

GYA member <u>Sandra Lopez-Verges</u> (Gorgas Memorial Institute for Health Studies, Panama) was one of the panellists, and GYA member and SAYAS Co-Chair <u>Roula Inglesi-Lotz</u> (University of Pretoria, South Africa) acted as the moderator. Issues of gender and equity were front and centre as the panellists discussed the various roles they are currently playing in efforts to tackle the COVID-19 pandemic. What was clear, however, was the lack of adequate numbers of female scientists in key leadership roles to afford alternative ways of problem-solving. Whilst strides have been made in giving women a voice, more can still be done to unlock the potential of women within the African continent, within the scientific community, and society in general.

INGSA Global Week of Dialog on COVID-19

In September, the International Network for Governmental Science Advice (INGSA) organised a <u>Global Week of Dialogue</u> titled "Science Advice and COVID-19: What are we learning?". Various online events looked at how the COVID-19 pandemic has tested the role and functionality of science advice and science diplomacy mechanisms around the world.

Following a keynote address by Soumya Swaminathan, Chief Scientist of the World Health Organisation, a High Level Panel (including GYA past co-chair <u>Tolu Oni</u> - University of Cambridge School of Clinical Medicine, United Kingdom) discussed "What was done right and what has gone wrong in pandemic responses to date?", and addressed some of the main challenges the global system of science and governance have faced in recent months.

The week continued with four regional panels for Asia, Africa (with GYA alumna <u>Shaheen</u> <u>Motala-Timol</u> - Tertiary Education Commission, Mauritius), Europe and the Americas. Early responses in Asia were discussed, as were the lessons of previous pandemics applied in Africa, and the multi-level efforts in the Americas as well as the complex coordination activities in Europe.

The regional panel live session for Asia/Oceania was moderated by GYA member <u>Abhi</u> <u>Veerakumarasivam</u> (Sunway University, Malaysia), who is also Chair of the INGSA Asia Regional Chapter. The session was framed around the grand challenge of addressing the devastating impact of the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic. The panel aimed at teasing out new learnings from how the region has dealt with the unprecedented circumstances of the pandemic. The panelists shared their individual organisation's or country's unique preparedness, response and recovery plans.

The INGSA week closed with a roundtable session on "Science advice in the UN and Multi-lateral System", which can be watched <u>here</u>.
