Joint GYA/CoARA AGM event "Reforming Research Assessment to Foster an Open and Socially Responsive Research Culture"

The workshop, which is part of the <u>CoARA Boost</u> project, will examine current research assessment practices that perpetuate a "publish or perish" culture, prioritise quantity over quality, and reward prestige over integrity.

Discussants will explore efforts such as the Declaration on Research Assessment (<u>DORA</u>), the Latin American Forum on Research Assessment (<u>FOLEC-CLACSO</u>), and the Coalition for Advancing Research Assessment (<u>CoARA</u>), all of which seek reform by promoting openness, integrity, and equity.

European Commission Science Advice Mechanism – One Health

GYA nominee <u>Tomislav Meštrović</u> (University North, Croatia) was invited to join evidence-gathering activities on the topic "Cross sectoral evidence-based governance for One Health in the European Union".

GYA members come together in interdisciplinary groups and projects to address global challenges relevant at the intersection of science and society, on issues such as biodiversity, global health, climate change, science advice, and science diplomacy.

Research Environment



This theme encompasses working groups and projects dealing with the conditions in which research – inside and outside academia – is embedded. Activities include support and advocacy for women in science and at-risk scholars, discussions and engagement on open science and research evaluation, as well as research on the conditions of young scientists in different world regions.

Promoting science education and outreach has always been a pillar of GYA member activities. In these projects, GYA members focus on international exchange, education for youth and citizen science.

New GYA Incubator on Science Diplomacy in Africa

For the 2024 funding period for GYA Activities Groups, GYA members will be active in 15 working groups and one Incubator within the three GYA Themes of Science & Society, Research Environment, and Science Education and Outreach.

An additional new Incubator has been established to work on "Science Diplomacy in Africa". 


Iberoamerican Young Academies hold first meeting



SAPEA Survey: Science for Policy

SAPEA - part of the European Commission's Scientific Advice Mechanism - is working to increase the participation of early- and mid-career researchers (EMCRs) in all its activities. To support this effort, they are conducting a survey to highlight the opportunities and understand the challenges that EMCRs face when engaging in science-for-policy work.

The survey is led by the Young Academies Science Advice Structure (YASAS) network in Europe, of which the GYA is a member academy.

If you are a researcher based in Europe, please consider filling out this survey, which is an online 15-minute questionnaire and will be open until 30 April 2024.

All research career stages are welcome to participate to provide data for comparison. The findings of this survey will be publicly accessible as a published report on the hurdles EMCRs face in engaging with science-for-policy (summer 2024).
